



## Recent COVID-19 Load Impacts





## Observations on Impact of COVID-19 on Load

- Peak impacts had eased through the Summer, but are now showing signs of reemerging as the impact of heightened weather sensitivity fades. July to August weekday impacts came in 1.9% less (~2,600 MW) than what we would have anticipated. Through September, this figure increased to 3.4% (~3,400 MW) though with noticeably larger impacts in the second half of the month.
- Energy impacts remain larger than peak, but show the same trend. July to August energy peaks were 4.1% and through September have been 4.9%.
- Consider these estimates to be a guide not a rule.
