



State Policies Workbook *Overview*

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- The Independent State Agencies Committee (ISAC) is an independent, standalone committee consisting of Members from regulatory and other state agencies representing the states and the District of Columbia within the PJM service area.
- Through ISAC, the PJM states assembled and submitted a workbook of state policy assumptions for PJM to consider for incorporation into transmission planning scenario studies and the Regional Transmission Expansion Plan (RTEP).
 - The State Policies Workbook was submitted by ISAC for the first time in Dec. 2023 for consideration in the 2024 RTEP planning cycle.¹

The version of the work that ISAC provided to PJM in Dec. 2023 detailed the PJM states' respective policies on:

- Renewable portfolio standards and other clean energy policies
- Generator deactivations driven by retirement policies
- Policies supporting existing generation
- Electrification policies (buildings and electric vehicles)
- Generator siting restrictions / opportunity zones
- Resource specific targets (offshore wind and storage)

States also provided assumptions on where new gas generation can or likely will be built, including technology restrictions on new gas units (i.e., CCS only). This type of data can be used as an input to the capacity expansion model that PJM plans to use for long-term regional transmission planning.

- The initial policy categories for the State Policies Workbook was reflective of PJM’s original LTRTP workshop series and proposed framework (pre-FERC Order No. 1920). These policy assumptions from were also used in the “LTRTP Workshop Policy Study.”
- PJM intends to work with the states to enhance the workbook’s template and capture policy inputs necessary for Order 1920 scenario development. This will include:
 - Identifying how policies are categorized according to Order 1920 scenario factors.
 - Detailing how broadly-defined policies can be implemented and reflected in transmission planning models, as necessary.

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
